Shepparton Search and Rescue Squad:

Shepparton Search & Rescue Squad has provided emergency response services to the Shepparton community at all hours of the day and night for 50 years. As a fully independent organisation that does not receive State or Federal Funding, this is an amazing achievement that should be recognised by the Shepparton Community.

With over 50 years of continuous service to the Shepparton Community, they go above and beyond any hour of the day or time of year to help the greater Shepparton community under some stressful situations. They always keep cool heads, and simply get their job done!

Goulburn Valley Pride:

This team of volunteers are individually amazing, and although each had their personal challenges I am so proud of the way we banded together to support each other, to maintain and grow the profile of GV Pride and to support this vulnerable community through very rough times.

Since that time, homely tasks have been undertaken to tidy up, refurbish kitchens and plan on bathroom refurbishments to work at finalising the big picture of our building.

Kialla Golf Club Course Maintenance:

These volunteers undertake the complete maintenance of Kialla Golf Club. Without the volunteer team at Kialla Golf Club, we would not be in a position to commence our 59th year of operation which will be celebrated at Opening Day in 2022.

These members of Kialla Golf Club give their time tirelessly and are very humble as they undertake their volunteering. These volunteers have been performing these tasks since 1 March 2015.

Tatura Fire Brigade:

All our members work hard at all times of the day and night with no thanks or monetary rewards. This is a great opportunity to thank our volunteers for their work fighting fires, working with youth, working in our community and building our new station. Our volunteer team is crucial to ensure the survival of our brigade.





Long-serving Volunteer Award Nominee

Mr Sam Atukorala:

Sam is a rare commodity in the community, being prepared to volunteer at all levels and across a diverse range of activities. Sam's work in sport with the Greater Shepparton community saw him nominated for a Victorian Community Achievement Award conducted by the Victorian Multicultural Commission in 2021. Significantly whilst Sam is from an ethnic community and proud of his Sri Lankan heritage his volunteer work is not confined to the multicultural sector and he is involved in activity and organisations across the Greater Shepparton area.

Sam would be a worthy recipient of the award and his recognition would be well received not only by those closely associated with him but also by the community in general.

Mr William (Bill) Brown:

Bill Brown deserves this award in recognition of his selfless, consistent contribution to our local community with more than thirty years of volunteering at the Greater Shepparton Visitor Centre. Bill is the longest serving volunteer in our history. For more than twenty years of this time Bill actually volunteered with us twice a week, as well as pioneering tour guiding. Further, Bill volunteered at Mooroopna Football Club from 1991 to 2015, fundraising at the ground every Saturday and working in the canteen to support the club. Significantly, Bill was instrumental as President of the Greater Shepparton Botanic Gardens Association in campaigning for the establishment of an Australian Botanic Gardens in Shepparton, this original group worked to provide a solid base for the style and design of the gardens. The group then became the Friends of the Botanic Gardens committee which Bill served on for another 12 years.





Dr Peter Leffler:

Peter has continually promoted St John Ambulance and what it stands for. The time given by the volunteers in unmeasurable. Peter deserves this award when you consider the incredible amount of hours of volunteering he has given to the Shepparton Region over the years since 1973.

Members of St John Ambulance in Shepparton do not get any recognition for their volunteering. They work in the background with no promotion of their talents. They do intense study to be competent in first aid. This is a way to put St John Ambulance members to the fore and to be recognised as a necessary volunteering organisation. Many events can't go ahead without First Aid.

Mr Len Taylor:

Len is one of longest serving active members of the Goulburn Valley Woodworkers Club (since 1996). Without Len, we would struggle to function including all the little things that go unnoticed. Len is the glue that holds the club together. He always goes over and above for any member, any event and the club itself. He has been the coordinator of the annual woodshow for over 20 years. The show's success is down to Len and his coordination and manner in which he conducts himself. He is the friendly face and gentle advisor that new and current members look to. He is the holder of all knowledge and history about the club. Len endears himself to anyone he talks to. He is the face of the GV Woodworkers and deserves to be acknowledged for his unending dedication to the club.





Mrs Patricia Warnett:

Trish's involvement in the Tatura community spans many decades. Not only has she dedicated much of her time to committees but also is renowned for her quiet assistance of those in need.

Trish has provided support to the local community over many decades, including the individual support she has given to many.

Trish has made a difference to the many committees that she has been involved with. She has provided daily involvement and support to many in need which has included providing meals, bringing in newspapers and bins, arranging medical appointments, picking up medications, washing and ironing and house cleaning and just being available for a 'listening ear".

Pandemic Response – Individual Nominees

Mr Declo Bisimwa:

Originally from DR Congo (Africa), Declo has been living in Australia for twelve years. He was a refugee for twelve years living in a refugee camp in Uganda before having the opportunity to move to Australia. He has a Masters in Social Work and works as a Men's Respondent Practitioner for Family Violence at The Orange Door Shepparton.

In his usual life, Declo is the Founder and Director of an Australian Youth Leadership Foundation – Masomo Mbele (School First) Foundation. They aim to inspire Australian-African communities to contribute in the meaningful way to improve the lives of those living without hope. He volunteers for the GV Congolese Association as a funeral coordinator, fundraising president and a community youth mentor.

During the COVID Shepparton outbreak, Declo worked significantly long hours sourcing, delivering and advocating around culturally appropriate food and emergency relief for local families who were seeking his support.





Mrs Amy De Paola:

Amy would have put in hundreds of volunteer hours as the main driver of the Food Link project. It has been a win-win both for the community generally and the business community. She started it from the ground up and was able to enlist the support of many other community members to help. She ensured people who needed help received the best, free meals, paid for by donors, meaning restaurants and cafes could keep their heads above water. Food Link has been an outstanding initiative that has been fallowed and revived when needed as the pandemic has waxed and waned. Amy has always been ready to jump in to action.

Ms Judi Hanlon:

Judi is a volunteer with the Australian Red Cross; a key partner in the Victorian Emergency Management System. One of Red Cross's responsibilities is to coordinate and provide relief services to ensure communities are effectively supported in an emergency. However, the Shepparton Covid-19 outbreak in August/September 2021 presented a massive emergency relief challenge. Judi was able to coordinate teams of Red Cross volunteers and work collaboratively with community groups, volunteers and relief organisations and logistics, to ensure that affected households received the food and other supplies that they needed.

While the peak of that relief effort has passed, Covid-19 is still with us and Judi continues to coordinate and deliver emergency food relief across Greater Shepparton. Judi continues to demonstrate her dedication to supporting the community, going to great lengths to ensure that food relief deliveries are completed each weekend. Judi's unwavering commitment to this humanitarian voluntary service is outstanding.





Pandemic Response – Team Nominees

Shepparton Search and Rescue Squad:

Because they are awesome!!

As a fully independent organisation reliant on volunteers, supported financially through community fundraising, and the occasional limited grants from State and Federal funding, SSRS has provided continuous, uninterrupted Emergency Response services 24 hours 7 day a week for 50 years, this is an amazing achievement which should be recognised and celebrated by the Greater Shepparton are community.

SSRS pride themselves in their swift response to the COVID-19 pandemic.

Tatura Community House - Helping Hands Volunteers:

This group deserve this award as the food relief project was really a culmination of two years' work in assisting people who live and work in the community and who were experiencing, sometimes severe hardship and isolation. The generosity of time and hard work, sometimes under pressure was amazing. The Food Relief team assisted 392 individuals by cooking and delivering over 600 meals, as well as delivering food hampers and Christmas hampers to a further 200 households - all from the goodness of their heart. The group delivered on our statement that "your community cares".

GV Cares, a Greater Shepparton Lighthouse Project initiative:

Volunteers offered their assistance out of a genuine desire to help our community. Collectively they were eager, resourceful, and generous with their time and demonstrated an excellent sense of teamwork. With time-critical need, volunteers went above and beyond to ensure those in isolation were cared for as soon as possible.





Shepparton Family & Financial Services Emergency Relief Team:

These individuals made management easy throughout the pandemic and their eagerness to assist where ever possible, adapting to regular changing government regulations but still making sure they were safe, and their families safe, caring for the Shepparton Community at large, and caring for all workers at Shepparton Family and Financial Services was incredible. They have become a very close knit team, bringing out each other's strengths and working on their weaknesses together for the betterment of themselves and our agency. This pandemic brought to light what a huge difference working in a team can achieve rather than as individuals.

Settlement Hub Team at Uniting led by Sara Noori:

Government messages and regular updates were promptly simplified and translated into different languages, and developed as timestamped audio resources and delivered to clients. The team assisted in the COVID19 Mobile information units also at multiple locations. An emergency relief system was set up for asylum-seekers referred by Services Australia who were in financial hardship. Referral pathways and material aid from donors benefited more than 40 non-client individuals. Team interpreters explained complicated housing issues to clients by phone, while housing support workers liaised with local Real Estate agencies to avoid any risk of homelessness. Settlement support continued delivery of a critical program through multilingual team members working overtime with about 30 clients to set up digital platforms. Team members escorted clients in small groups to COVID19 testing centres. In collaboration with Greater Shepparton Foundation and local agencies, volunteers and members of the team delivered nearly 500 meals to vulnerable clients.





Well Wise Women Program:

The ability of the WWW Community Health Educators to adapt their program to the needs of the community and do so in a way that provided immediate and essential supplies to vulnerable community members deserves recognition and the appreciation of the wider community. These women contributed exceptionally long hours in voluntary work and put their own money towards fuel for deliveries and food.

Point of Difference Studio:

During the COVID-19 Shepparton outbreak, Betul, Melissa and their team at the POD worked exceptionally long hours and utilised their own financial resources to ensure CALD families were provided with food relief and essentials to remain isolated and treat their COVID infections.

They identified community members in need through their existing relationships with young people and their families. They sourced culturally appropriate food and personal supplies and delivered them to those in need. They advocated at multiple local and regional meetings on the gaps in current emergency relief arrangements.





Greater Shepparton Unites in Voice:

Greater Shepparton Unites in Voice was an online live streamed event held on Friday 8th October between 7.00pm – 9.00pm. A number of passionate locals from Greater Shepparton acknowledged the impact and response of the strength of community spirit during the lockdown/quarantine residents faced in August 2021. The group wanted to celebrate and acknowledge the community.

All individuals involved already work full time, but as the event started to develop momentum and public interest everyone understood and supported the vision of giving our community a great big hug and help make a small idea come to life.

Without this group of individuals the idea that started as 'just an idea' would still be that - an idea.

Their support, enthusiasm, belief and dedication to the project will always be something I'm thankful for.
